

Caregivers Guide to Poison Prevention

# What substances can be poisonous?

Any substance or product can be poisonous if it causes an unwanted or unexpected reaction. The reaction can range from something as mild as a rash or stomach ache to something more serious resulting in hospitalization or death.

### **HOW DO POISONINGS HAPPEN?**

- Ingestion—Eating or drinking something
- **Skin contact**—Splashing, spilling or rubbing something on the skin
- Eye contact—Splashing a harmful substance into the eye
- Inhalation—Breathing dangerous fumes
- **Bites/stings**—Getting bitten/stung by insects, snakes or spiders

### **PREVENTION TIPS**

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- **Teach** children to "always ask first" before eating or drinking anything you haven't given them.
- **Store** potentially harmful products in cabinets with child-resistant safety locks or up high and out of reach.
- **Don't** store cleaning products and food/beverages in the same cabinets or areas.
- **Keep** all potentially poisonous substances in their original container with original labels, including cleaners, medicines, supplements, herbals, and products used for home repair, gardening and automobiles.
- **Always** read labels and directions before using potentially poisonous substances. Use only as directed.
- Close all containers tightly immediately after use.
- **Rinse** out all empty containers for products such as bleaches and cleaners before discarding.

### **MEDICINE SAFETY**

Children, especially toddlers, are often curious about medicines. Take extra precautions with medications you may have around the house, in your bag(s) and vehicle:

- **Keep** medicines in their original containers and store them in locked cabinets.
- Don't place or store medications within reach of children.
- **Use** child-resistant containers for medications in your purse or backpack. **Note:** Daily pill containers/organizers may be child-resistant but they are not child-proof.
- **Dispose** of old or unused medications: <u>https://www.fda.</u> gov/drugs/safe-disposal-medicines/disposal-unusedmedicines-what-you-should-know
- Never call medicine candy or make a game out of taking it.
- **Always** turn on a light and wear your glasses, if necessary, when taking or giving medicines.

### HANDBAG/PURSE/ BACKPACK SAFETY

Don't allow children to play with your or others' handbag, purse or backpack. Many things in them can be hazardous if they get into a young child's mouth. These include makeup, perfumes, ointment/ creams, medications, hand sanitizer and cannabis edibles. Some of these items may also pose a choking hazard.
